TV, radio commercials feature new milk theme

ROSEMONT, III. - "Gas Jockey" is one of three American Dairy Association 30-second TV commercials featuring its new "Milk's The One" theme. It is being aired in markets of participating member organizations on a rotating basis with "Arcade" and "Basketball".

ADA's new TV commercials emphasize milk drinking attitudes. Each spot announcement focuses on a leader-type teenager whose decisions set the pace for followers. That independent individual is pictured choosing milk in a free-choice situation where too often other beverages are usually selected.

Filmed in New York, "Gas Jockey" features a gas station attendant who is joined by friends for a "carry-out" food break. He grabs a carton of milk from the station's cooler and says: "I don't have to think

about what to drink 'cause milk's the one for me."

This theme line runs through the three announcements in the pool: "Arcade" shows a girl with friends stopping for a snack after playing pinball machine, "Basketball" stars a teenager and his pals who bounce a basketball down the street enroute to a fast food shop.

A movie buff coaxes the refreshment counter girl to squirt some extra butter on his popcorn. A young man at an expensive restaurant tries to fill his date with rolls and butter so she won't order a high-priced meal. A struggling poet uses the word "butter" to replace better because "butter is better."

These humorous approaches are featured in American Dairy Association's new radio commercials "Movie "Fancy House," Restaurant" and "The Poet." The three 30-second spot-announcements, designed to develop listener

awareness of butter through humor, will be aired nationally on the CBS and ABC radio networks.

The new radio commercials highlight the comedic talents of Wayne Juhlen and Penny Lane. This famous team has appeared on many popular TV shows and currently has a comedy program on Chicago radio.

ADA of South Dakota will purchase air time for the network radio commerical. These member organizations will also share costs for piggybacking the butter spots with milk commercials in other unit areas.
