Paul Harvey to keynote FFA convention

ALEXANDRAI, Va. - Paul Harvey, America's most honored news commentator heads the list of keynote speakers scheduled to address the Golden Anniversary Convention of the Future Farmers of America in Kansas City, November 7 to 10. Harvey will address the Thursday morning convention session.

Kyle Rote, Jr., of Houston, Texas, a recipient of the North American Soccer League's "Rookie of the Year" will address the convention Wednesday afternoon. For many years a star of the Dallas Tornados, his athletic prowess has been well demonstrated since 1974 when he entered the nationally televised

"Superstars" competition and placed first over a field of world-famous athletes, including Pete Rose, John Havlicek and O.J. Simpson. He repeated as champion in 1976 and 1977.

Jerry Clower, a "salesman of the really good life" will be the featured speaker at the Friday morning convention session. Clower is a humorist with albums which tickle the nation's funnybone. He's been a guest on top shows in television and radio, including his recent appearance on the TV special to present the Country Music Awards.

Dr. Ernest Boyer, United States Commissioner of Education will give remarks at the Thursday afternoon session. Boyer was appointed to his position by the President of the United States in 1977, resigning his position as Chancellor of the State University of New York to head up the U.S. Office of Education. As top official of education in the

United States, Boyer is responsible for fulfilling the mandates of Congress as they relate to vocational education in the U.S. and for carrying out Public Law 81-740 as it relates to the Future Farmers of America.

Convention speakers will be welcomed to Kansas City and introduced to the convention audience by a delegation of FFA members headed by 20-year-old National FFA President J. Ken Johnson of Macogdoches, Texas.

very important, but not one is more important than the others, and they must be put together in the right amounts and ratios.

The products might also seem too expensive to someone who doesn't realize that profit over feed cost is more important than the cost of a ton of feed. If a ton of feed costs a little more but is in balance with your roughages, your profit over feed cost will be higher than it would be if you buy a real cheap feed that does not match your roughages. You must remember also that the more expensive per ton is not always the most expensive per cow per day. For example if you have a \$100 per ton feed and need to feed 20 pounds of it a day, it will cost you \$1.00 per cow per day for her grain ration. But on the other hand if you have a ton of feed that costs \$400. per ton and you need to feed only 2 pounds a day, this will cost you only 40 cents per cow per day for her grain ration.

They might also seem too expensive to someone who doesn't realize how expensive it is to doctor sick cows and replace 25-40 percent of the milking herd each year.

REMEMBER THIS — The most important figure is what does it cost to produce a pound of milk, not what is the cost of a truckload of feed, a ton of supplement, or a bag of vitamins and minerals.
