2¼ cup flour
¼ teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking soda
1 cup sour milk
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups raw diced apples

TOPPING:

½ cup brown sugar
¼ cup white sugar
½ teaspoon cinnamon
½ cup chopped nuts

Beat shortening, add sugar and eggs. Beat until fluffy. Add dry ingredients alternately with soda and sour milk combined. Fold in apples. Pour in greased pan and sprinkle topping over cake. Bake at 350°F. for 45 minutes.

Grange resolutions focus on money, estate planning and government

BUTLER -- Approximately 1800 delegates and visitors came to Butler during the week of October 23-26 to attend the 106th annual convention of the Pennsylvania State Grange in Butler.

During the convention the delegates considered 142 resolutions concerning both internal and external policy. Approximately 40 of these resolutions will be forwarded to National Grange for consideration at the National Grange Convention in Denver, Colo. Nov. 13-20.

The approved resolutions covered a broad range of subjects including:

Measures to increase the funding of the Agricultural Conservation Practices Program on the national level and to increase the maximum allowance on the local level.

Opposition to compulsory unionism for both private industry and public employees.

Allowing farms to be exempted from inheritance

taxes if they are passed on from one generation to another.

Several resolutions dealing with water allocation and the state water-quality plan.

Opposing the movement to give the District of Columbia two Senators in the U.S. Congress, but supporting any legislation giving it representatives according to present apportionment procedures.

Support of an amendment to the State Constitution that proposes to curb inflationary government spending patterns.

A call for the U.S. government to act responsibly to curb inflation.

Support of a computerized farm machinery iden-

tification system devised by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture to curb the current outbreak of thefts.

Opposition to the disclosure of the private financial matters of public officials and their immediate families.

Formation of a milk producers security fund that would pay a farmer for his product should the dealer default on payment. The proposed fund should be producer-financed and members of milk cooperatives would be excluded.

Also included among the resolutions were a number dealing with Grange activities and programs on a nationwide scale.

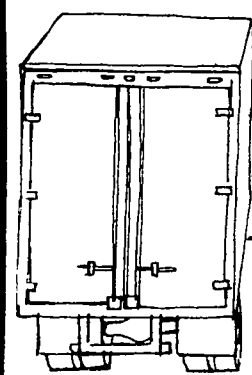

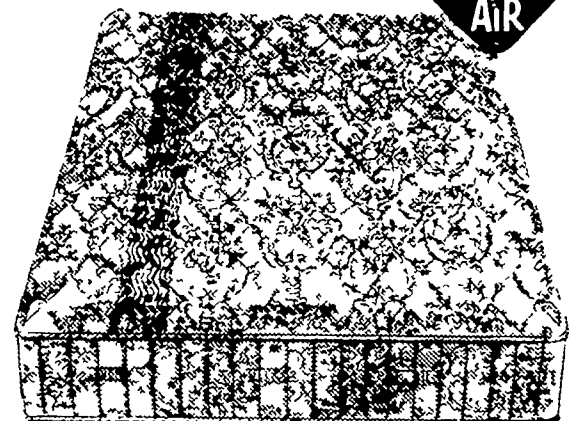
