Lisa Dobrosky wins nat'l. meats judging contest

YORK - York County's 4-H meats judging experts won another victory during national competition last week at Kansas City, Mo.

Lisa Dobrosky, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony G. Dobrosky, Glen Rock R2, topped all competitors to be named the overall winner in the national 4-H meats judging and identification contest at the American Royal Livestock Show.

She's the reigning county 4-H queen and has carried sheep projects for several years as a member of the county lamb club and the Glen Rock Community club.

Other members of the team, which finished fourth in the fifteen-state competition, are Brenda Walter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Walter, Airville R2, Chris Sunday, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sunday, York R1, and Steve Trostle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Trostle, Red Lion R2. Lisa was first in the total

overall meats judging portion of the competition, finishing with 430 points. Chris Sunday placed sixth with 423 points. York's team was a close second with 1253 points to Oklahoma's score of 1255 points.

In beef judging, the teammates earned a score of 413 points to place fifth. Wyoming captured that first place with a high score of 429 points.

The team took sixth place in pork judging, with Lisa placing fourth in individual scoring with 143 points, Chris Sunday at the tenth place with 133 points, and Brenda Walter in eleventh place one point lower.

Also scoring top in the retail meats judging category, Lisa earned the first place with 147 points, Chris with 141 points took sixth place, and Brenda with a tying 141 points was in

seventh, to earn the county the first place team spot.

In the meats identification portion of the judging, Lisa was third with 228 points, Chris finished eighth with 209 points and Brenda was tenth with 197 points, helping to earn the team the fifth place-spot.

The team from Nebraska won the overall team score with 1925 points, while Pennsylvania's fourth place was won with their accumulated 1887 points.

Other competitors represented Illinois, Wyoming, Alabama, Virginia, Kansas, Florida, Minnesota and Montana.
