## Corn conference Dec. 12

OCEAN CITY, Md. - This year's Delmarva Corn Technology Conference will be held on December 12, at the Convention Hall in Ocean City, Md.

Highlights of the day-long meeting will be a report on 1978 results from Delaware's 200 bushel corn program, a forecast on European corn borer activity for 1979, and a talk by former U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz on "Food - Foundation for Peace."

Other topics to be covered by the conference are safety in corn production, no-till corn fertilization and herbicides, and tillage techniques and their effects on crop production.

Of special interest should be a talk by Mark Powers,

executive vice president of commodities for Thompson-McKinnon Securities, Inc., of New York, on the subject: "Understanding the Workings of the Commodity Market."

Doors will open for exhibits, coffee and donuts at 8:30 a.m. The main program begins at 9:30. There is no registration fee and the meeting is open to the public. For complimentary lunch tickets or additional information, one can contact his county Extension agent or local agribusiness firms.

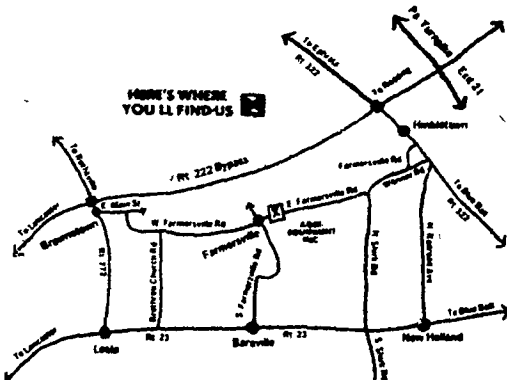
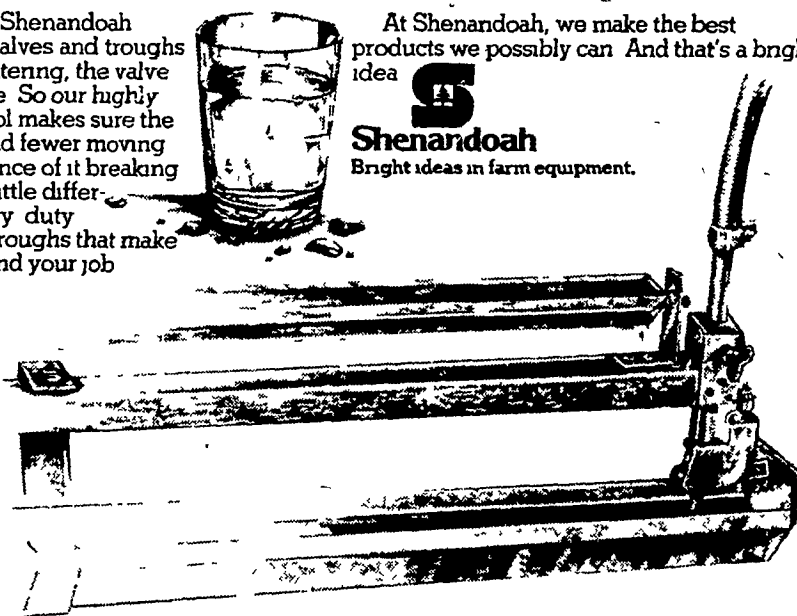
