A trophy, for outstanding service to the state's forage industry, was presented to Beachley November 20 at the Forage and Seed Conference held at Penn State.

In citing his accomplishments, Dr. John E. Baylor, Penn State Extension agronomist, says Beachley has a long and distinguished career in agriculture.

During the past 25 years, he has served several terms on the board of the Pennsylvania Grassland Council and as president. He also served as president of the Pennsylvania Seedsmen's Association and Atlantic Seedsmen's Seed Trade Association's Farm Seed Division.

Beachley served on the board of the Penn State College of Agriculture Advisory Council and PennAg Industries Association. Currently he is vice president of the Pennsvlvania Foundation Seed Cooperative.

A 1933 Penn State

graduate in agronomy, he first was engaged in seed certification work for the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, then for the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Following three years as an officer in the U.S. Navy, he worked four years in Germany, primarily in seed procurement for the occupied area of Western Germany.

In 1950, with William B. Hardy, they formed the Beachley-Hardy Seed Company, and he has served as president the past 28 years.

Active in community affairs, the award winner is a member of the West Shore Rotary Club and Robert Burns Lodge. Beachley also is an elder of the Paxton Presbyterian Church of Harrisburg.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The number of sheep and lambs on feed in seven selected States on November 1, 1978 totaled 1.19 million head, down 1 per cent from the 1.20 million head on feed a year

1.03 million placed during the same period last year.

Of the total number on feed November 1, 1978, 14 per cent weighed less than 70 pounds, 19 per cent weighed 70-79 pounds, 28 per cent ago. There were 1.06 million weighed 80-89 pounds, 25 per head placed on feed during cent weighed 90-99 pounds, September and October this and 14 per cent were 100 year, which compares with pounds and over in weight.
