WASHINGTON - Milk production in 1979 may total slightly above the estimated 1978 level of 122 billion pounds, and commercial use also may be slightly higher, according to a U.S. Department of Agriculture economist.

Charles N. Shaw, an agricultural economist with the department's Economics. Statistics, and

Cooperative Service, said that in early 1979, favorable milk-feed price relationships could stimulate heavier concentrate feeding and again mean sizable gains in output per cow.
