The fed cattle trade followed a very uneven pattern as weather was again the dominating factor the fore part of week. Severe blizzard conditions in eastern Iowa and across Illinois paralyzed traffic and virtually halted movement fleshy 900-1000 lbs. 59.00- of carcass beef into the 64.00.
