same amount either by raising the stubble height or by increasing the rate of Paraquat. Roundup, on the other hand, produced high yields at all rates tested (1/2, one and two quarts) with stubble height making relatively little difference.


reports Mitchell. Roundup was compared with Paraquat and Dow General plus oil. In these tests Williams soybeans were notill planted in 30-inch rows and 12 preemergence herbicide treatments were used in combination with each of the knock-down chemicals. Over a two-year period

there was a 10-bushel advantage in favor of Roundup. With the exception of Blazer, which controlled jimsonweed and pigweed when applied as a postemergence treatment, the pre- and postemergence herbicides

were ~ relatively snettective unless good initial weed control was achieved by the knock-down treatments.

No-tillage has been a good production system' for farmers who double crop small grains and soybeans because it saves precious

tune, energy and moisture, concludes the specialist. But good weed control is cirtical if the system is to function well. Where weed pressure is heavy it will pay to keep a close watch on both stubble height and your knock-down herbicide.


