

FFA plans National Hall of Achievement

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — Plans for a new Future Farmers of America (FFA) National Hall of Achievement to honor FFA and agriculture were announced recently by the FFA. A \$600,000 fund-raising effort has been initiated through the National FFA Foundation to implement the plan.

The new Hall of Achievement will be located in Alexandria, Va. inside the existing National FFA Center near Mt. Vernon which houses FFA operations, including FFA Program Administration, The National Future Farmer magazine, FFA Supply Service, and Alumni.

"Now it is time to honor the achievement of this fine organization and the great industry it has served so well," said Roland M. Hendrickson, president of the Agricultural Division of Pfizer, Inc., as he announced the fund drive for the new

endeavor at a meeting of the Agricultural Education Division of the American Vocational Association (AVA). After the presentation, the attending group voted unanimous cooperation and support for the project. Hendrickson, national chairman of the fund drive for the FFA Foundation, explained that the purpose was actually fourfold:

- Protecting and preserving FFA's history,
- Presenting the story of today's FFA through permanent exhibits and displays,
- Recognizing the support and leadership of FFA's many friends, and to
- Serving all FFA members and related groups as an active learning and resource center for FFA programs and activities.

"It will be a source of information and pride, as well as a record of accomplishment by FFA chapters and individuals," said H.N. Hun-

sicker, National FFA Advisor. "An important aspect of the Hall is that it will be mainly concerned with 'people achievements'."

"Milestones of Progress," "A Challenge to Excellence," and "Pride and Prestige" — are several of the titles of display areas planned for the Hall, which will use bold graphics and modern museum presentational methods to highlight the story of agriculture and the FFA.

A major part of the National FFA Center lower level will be utilized for the Hall of Achievement, which will be viewed by thousands of FFA members and guests each year.

Funds to reach the \$600,000 goal are being solicited from business, industry, foundations, FFA members, as well as FFA chapters and state associations. Meanwhile, an effort is also being made to locate early FFA momentos or paraphernalia that could be displayed in the Hall of Achievement.

One-half of the \$600,000 will be used to develop the final plans for the FFA Hall of Achievement, install it and purchase necessary equipment. Remaining funds will be invested in an endowment that will provide perpetual revenues for staffing, maintenance and operation of the Hall on a year-around basis.

A working, active library and resource center is also a part of the plan and will be open for use by students — both high school and college — as well as helpful during future seminars and workshops for youth and adults concerned with education and agriculture. Publications, audio-visuals, and equipment for their use will be a part of the library. More information about the new FFA Hall of Achievement and how to contribute is available from Donald N. Wind damages 680,000 acres

WASHINGTON, D.C. — More than 680,000 acres of land were damaged by wind erosion in the Great Plains during the last two months of 1978, according to R.M. Davis, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service (SCS).

Reports from the 10-state area indicate wind damage on 682,254 acres, down from 1,430,200 acres damaged during the same period in 1977. Montana, with 231,040 acres, accounted for more than 33 per cent of the total. The Northern Plains states were hardest hit, accounting for 60 per cent of the damaged acreage.

Davis indicated the major factors contributing to wind erosion this season were

continued cropping of sandy soils, lack of adequate plant growth and residues, and lack of soil moisture in some areas. Plant residue often was baled for cattle feed rather than left on the soil surface, he said.

More than 85 per cent of the 1978 damage was to cropland. SCS rated land damaged if enough soil has been removed or deposited to subject the land to further erosion hazard or to impair its productive capacity. Wind also destroyed crops or cover on 21,970 additional acres of land not damaged.

SCS compiles wind erosion reports covering seven months, November through May each year, using data supplied by almost 550 counties in the Great Plains.
