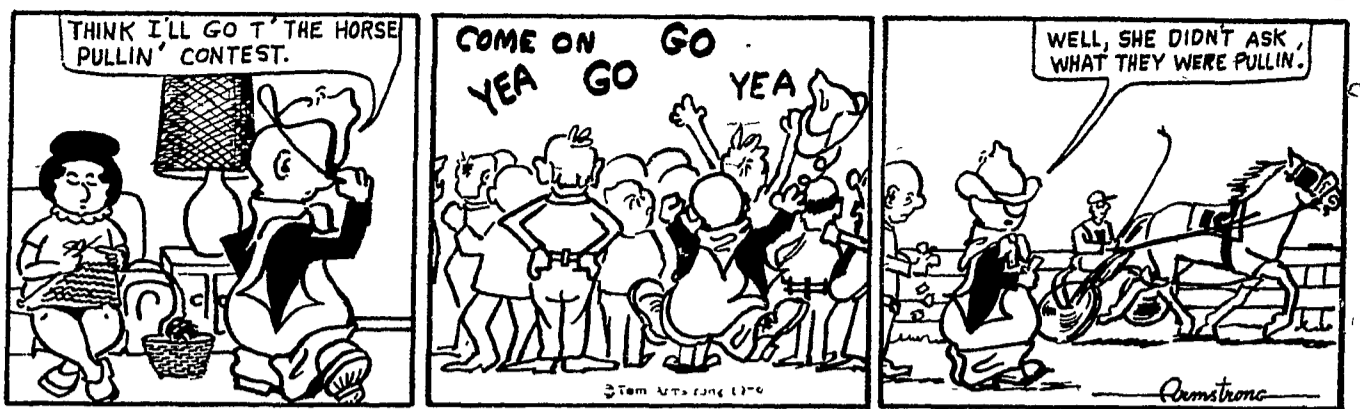

Tree planting demonstration planned

LANCASTER — The Lancaster County Cooperative Extension Service, in cooperation with the Forestry School of Penn State University, will conduct a tree-planting demonstration on Thursday, April 5, to show area farmers the benefits of natural windbreakers, etc.

All interested persons are welcome to attend, Lancaster County Extension Director Max Smith says. The planting session will take place at the Walter Brent farm, Manheim R6, beginning at 10 a.m. The Brent property is located along Orchard Road, off of Hosler Road, approximately one mile north of town.

Three rows of evergreens will be planted, says Smith. Assisting in the actual planting will be FFA members from Manheim Central High School. In addition, Jerry Reyburn and

David DeWalle from Penn State will lend their expertise to the practical learning sessions.

More information is available from the Lancaster County Cooperative Extension Service office.

After the trees are planted, the party will move on to tour property owned by Rev. and Mrs. Richard Canfield, Manheim R1, where rows of trees have been serving as natural windbreakers for the past six or seven years.

For those interested in reading more about the potential benefits of planting evergreens in rows, an article furnished by the New Jersey Cooperative Extension Service gives some details. It's printed on page 113 of this newspaper.

available. Since poultry manure may contain from 10% to 90% nitrogen, depending upon moisture and litter content, it can burn crops and result in disappointments. Gardeners should be alert and refrain from using fresh poultry manure in their soil, to any great amounts. On crop land it is suggested that poultry manure applications be limited to not more than 4 to 5 ton per acre. Keep in mind that some poultry manure might contain 50 per cent or more of available nitrogen and can burn seeds and crop roots.

Poultry manure is also the highest in phosphorus and potash content of any of our farm manures. The 1979 Agronomy Guide gives additional details about the fer-

tilizer values of farm manures.

TO MAKE A WILL

The statement, "We don't own enough to justify a will" is over-used by many families. If you have a family, and if you own anything, you should have a will. If a person dies without a will, property is distributed according to the Interstate Laws of Pennsylvania. These laws may not distribute your estate according to your desires. This has often happened in the past and there is little that can be done about it without a will.
