Nat. spokesmen to talk at Congress '79

KANSAS CITY, Mo. - National spokesmen representing a wide variety of viewpoints will discuss Livestock Marketing Congress '79's theme question: are there workable alternatives, for the industry and consumer, to simply "riding the cycle"?

The final session of the June 13 to 15 Congress, to be held at Denver's Marriott Hotel, bring together these individual's: Kathleen O'Reilly, executive director, Consumer Federation of America (CFA); William Rusher, publisher of the conservative magazine, "National Review;" Barbara Keating, director of the Consumer Alert Council; Loren Carlson, president of the National Cattlemen's Association; Gar Alperovitz, co-director of the National Center for Economic Alternatives, described by a national magazine as a "liberal think tank supported by 35 foundations;" and Dale Tinstman, vice chairman of the board of Iowa Beef Processors, the nation's largest meat packers.

Congress General Chairman Robert D. Walker said the 2½-hour session on Friday morning, June 15, will be moderated by Bill Monroe, moderator of NBC-TV's "Meet The Press."

He will lead the participants, Walker said, in a "free-wheeling exchange of facts and views on this issue

of most vital importance to everyone interested in the livestock industry: are there ways to smooth out the livestock cycle so that producers and consumers can be spared from its harsh extremes"?

"This outstanding speaker line-up represents the liberal and conservative viewpoint of many sectors of our society," Walker said. "Kathleen O'Reilly leads a very activist organization, and her position in CFA was formerly held by USDA Assistant Secretary Carol Foreman.

"Barbara Keating, on the other hand, represents a newer group, one that takes a more moderate viewpoint, realizing that consumer rights must be balanced with the rights of others in our society."

Alperovitz, Walker noted, was recommended to President Carter by several liberal Congressmen to be a member of the influential Council of Economic Ad-

visers. Although he was not appointed, Alperovitz has continued speaking out on consumer issues, and has called for "widespread rallies and teach-ins" to protest rising prices.

Publisher Rusher is also a syndicated newspaper columnist, has authored three books and numerous magazine articles.

Representing two sectors of the livestock industry's viewpoint will be the NCA's Carlson and IBP's Tinstman.

Earlier session will discuss various alternatives to "riding the cycle," including more government involvement; an industry-managed cycle, and better management by individual producers, Walker said.

problems with the strawberries, she would like to see a couple of inches of rain for a little growth. She commented that she thought that it would be about a month until the strawberries started to arrive.

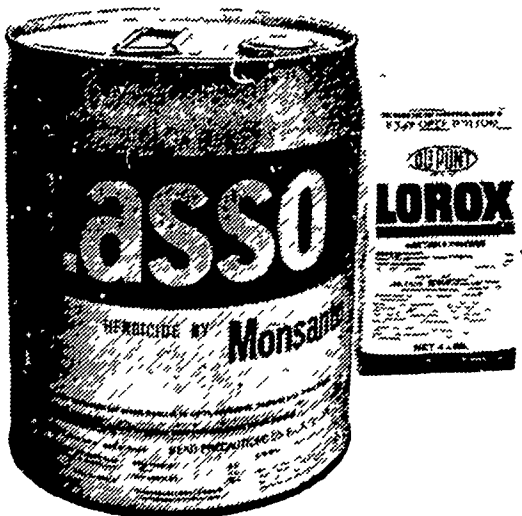
And Bob Gooding, from the Masonic Homes,
