Eastern will distribute profits' SYRACUSE, N.Y. - In

view of a positive direction in their cooperative's cash flow picture, delegates of Eastern Milk Producers Cooperative Association, Inc. have voted to distribute profits first to present members who were subject to "reblend" or extra marketing costs The action was one of seven which was finalized here during the cooperative's annual meeting at the Hotel Syracuse

In addition, Eastern moved to increase its membership campaign efforts, particularly in the New England area

Also on the approved list were resolutions to fight a lawsuit that has been levied against Eastern by 50 disenchanted members "This delegate body opposed to the lawsuit, is not

a part of or represented by the group of plaintiffs in the lawsuit and supports the board of directors in their defense of the lawsuit," the action read.

Other resolutions approved at the meeting included action to support legislation which will continue the 80 per of parity

Only one of the seven resolutions was defeated That one dealt with the Multi-Lateral Trade Agreement. The proposal of some Eastern members had been to have the Senate modify the allotments of cheese to be imported into the United States The minority opinion was that the Multi-Lateral Trade Agreement was not in the best interest of dairy farmers.
