

Big farms dominate production

gross sales sales of less than \$10,000 accounted for 38 per cent of all farms, but less than five per cent of all production expenses, according to Farm Production Expenditures for 1978, an annual publication issued by USDA's Crop Reporting Board.

The publication reported that production expenses for the nation's 2,366,060 farms totaled \$114.2 billion last year, up 16.6 per cent from the \$97.9 billion total of 1977.

Expenses averaged \$48,273 per farm in 1978, up from \$36,238 in 1977, according to the government figures.

Costs of feed, livestock, farm machinery, wages, and rent accounted for more than half of the over-all total, the same as a year earlier. But the sharpest rises were in costs of livestock, farm machinery, wages, and interest.

Livestock expenses jumped nearly a third; farm

machinery and interest each moved up 25 per cent.

Though feed expenses remained the top single item and moved up 13 per cent, they accounted for only 141/2 per cent of all expenditures last year, compared to 14.8 per cent the year before.

The government report showed the nation's smaller farms operating at losses. The smallest, those with gross sales of less than \$2500 a year, had average farm expenses of \$6203.

Another common sight contributing to the atmosphere of a jungle is that of plants growing up over the windows so thickly that light cannot get into the house. Usually, the plants were planted too close together when they were small, and no one gave any thought to allowing space for growth as the plants increased in size.

With the beauty that is being built into most newer homes, there is no need to "hude" any part of the building as was common in the past. All landscaping should be done for a purpose. The most unportant places for shrubs or smaller plants around your house will be the corners and around the entrance. Your home may or

may not need plants between landscape planning, send for the door and the corner. Other uses you may find for plant materials around the foundation of your house could include framing your home or to soften large, unbroken wall surfaces.







