would happen, for instance, if undesirable deposits turned up in milk samples?

Even milk handlers admit being stuck on that question, because the land-spray system is so new that there is no policy on it. They expect they'd have to abide by whatever ruling state officials would put out. Some bottlers already have policy to not accept milk from herds fed on land where regular sewage sludge is spread.

Research studies, done for last 16 years at Penn State, say a problem with undesirable carryover of metal and chemicals is unlikely.

But a report of the "Living Filter Project" in the May-June 1978 issue of WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ASSOCIATION OF PENNSYLVANIA MAGAZINE, which carried a favorable report of the method, says: "Concentrations of copper, zinc, cadmium, lead, nickel and cobalt in the soil of reed canarygrass and corn silage plots were measured. No significant contamination of the soil was found. In both vegetation types the concentrations of copper and zinc increased slightly in the plants, but not to levels which would pose a hazard to the food chain."

"The article continues with comments on effects on wildlife ".....Liver, kidney and bone tissues of cottontail rabbits trapped on irrigated and control sites were analyzed for cadmium, copper, nickel, lead and zinc. Results indicated no significant differences for

any of the elements except that copper concentrations in kidney tissue were slightly higher in rabbits from irrigated sites."

Some property owners in the area are equally worried about possible long-term contamination of their wells since ground water-levels are shown to increase in land-spray areas.

Property owners, engineering specialists and the Sewage Authority are expected to be on hand for the public hearing meeting on Tuesday evening.

"Peck" Foster, the 93rd district's state legislator, has also been contacted on the implications of the land-spray plans.

"It's certainly regrettable that federal grants become a form of leverage to bring about the adoption of systems that result in the acquisition of prime agricultural land by governmental units," he says. "Apparently the federal government has decided to subsidize one type of system over another and this leaves local officials in an impossible position."
