WHAT'S NEW

FLEX-AUGERS
MILFORD, Ind. - Chore-Time Equipment Inc. has announced major changes in the appearance and components of the company's Flex-Auger Feed Delivery Systems, according to Brad Donahoe, vice-president of marketing.

Changes include new identification terminology for the three models of Flex-Auger, the use of specially formulated PVC auger tubing, and the use of direct-drive gearheads, Donahoe said.

About the only thing remaining the same, he pointed out, is the unique centerless, spring-type auger itself. The patented design idea was originally developed by Chore-Time in 1962 and is widely used for

feeding poultry, hogs, and cattle. The fully enclosed auger moves feed or grain up, down, on-the-level, or around corners using no gears, connections, or pins.

Explaining the new product naming, Donahoe said it should simplify references to the three sizes of Flex-Auger the company manufactures. The new "family of Flex-Augers" is made up of Chore-Time Flex-Auger Model 50 (2-inch tube, 20-lb. per minute capacity); Model 75 (3-inch, 40 lb./min.); and Model 90 (3½-inch, 100 lb./min.). The model number actually refers to the approximate outside diameter of the auger tube in millimeters, said Donahoe.

Another change is that all the company's feed delivery

systems now feature specially formulated PVC tubing as a standard item. Donahoe indicated the formula was developed after several years of research and testing. It contains special wear inhibitors, he said, and ingredients to

protect it from the effects of the sun's ultra-violet rays.

The new PVC tubing out-wears the formerly used steel in most applications, provides quieter operation, and PVC can't rust like steel can.
