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Penna.'s estimated crop production for the year

HARRISBURG — Based on September 1 conditions, Pennsylvania's production of soybeans for beans, winter wheat, oats and pears should all be above last year, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service. Production of barley, tobacco and grapes is expected to be below a year ago.

Corn for grain production is expected to be the same as last year at 113,150,000 bushels. Both acreage for harvest at 1,190,000 acres and a yield of 95 bushels per acre are unchanged from a year ago.

Winter wheat production is forecast at 8,122,000 bushels, slightly more than last year. The wheat crop should be harvested from 262,000 acres with an indicated yield of 31 bushels per acre. Oats production is forecast at 18,425,000 bushels, up two percent from 1978. Acreage for oats harvest is indicated at 335,000 acres, compared with 340,000 acres last year.

Barley production is forecast at 4,800,000 bushels, down 18 percent from last year's 5,875,000 bushels. Barley acreage for harvest

decreased this year to 100,000 acres from 125,000 acres a year ago. An estimated 6,000 acres of sorghum for grain is expected to be harvested with an average yield of 62.0 bushels per acre. Production should total 372,000 bushels.

Tobacco production is expected to total 22,750,000 pounds, down 10 percent from last year's 25,220,000 pounds. Acreage for harvest is expected to be the same as last year, but the yield indicated currently at 1,750 pounds per acre is expected to be much lower than last year's 1,940 pounds.

Pear production, forecast at 4,100 tons, is 24 percent above last year's 3,300 tons. Grape production, forecast at 57,000 tons, is slightly less than last year's 57,500 tons.

At the U.S. level, corn production is forecast at a record high 7.27 billion bushels, two per cent above the August 1 forecast and three per cent more than last year's record. Sorghum grain production is forecast at 814 million bushels, up nine per cent from last year. U.S. feed grain production (corn, sorghum, oats and

barley combined) is two per cent more than last year. All wheat production is placed at 2.12 billion bushels, 18 per cent more than last year and the second largest crop on record. Winter wheat production is up 28 per cent from last year.

Food grain production (wheat, rye, and rice combined) is expected to be 16 per cent above 1978. Soybean production is forecast at a record high 2.17 billion bushels, 18 per cent larger than the 1978 crop.

All tobacco production is forecast at 1.73 billion pounds, down 15 per cent from 1978. Oats production is estimated at 531.2 million bushels, down 12 per cent from a year ago. Barley production is forecast at 364.2 million bushels, a drop of 19 per cent from last year.

Pear production is expected to total 803,100 tons, up ten per cent from 1978. Grape production is forecast 4.8 million tons, six per cent more than a year ago.

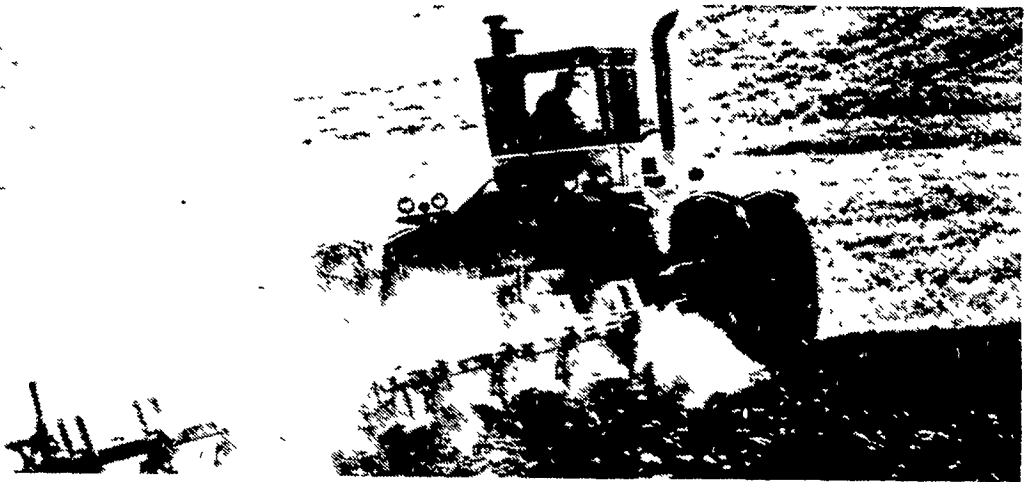


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
