

Berks Co. horse members win at Maryland contest

TIMONIUM - Six Berks County 4-H members recently participated in the Junior Horseman Contest at The Eastern National Livestock Show in Timonium, Maryland. These members won top individual, third place individual, and first and fourth place Team out of 112 other

contestants and 28 other teams.

Winning the coveted Junior Horseman of the Year and a \$1000 scholarship was Meg Allen of Shoemakersville. Betsy Heist, Sinking Spring, was third high individual of the contest and will receive \$40. The team of Betsy Heist

and Steve Imes, Fleetwood, and Bonnie Troutman, Sinking Spring, took the top team award and a \$50 check. Meg Allen, Cheryl and Karen Clayton, Birdsboro, won the fourth place team title and a \$20 check.

The competition included judging four classes of horses, answering 50

questions about the horse industry, identifying items related to horses, and

judging a class of hay. Betsy Heist and Meg Allen also participated in a stringent

interview to determine the Junior Horseman of the Year.

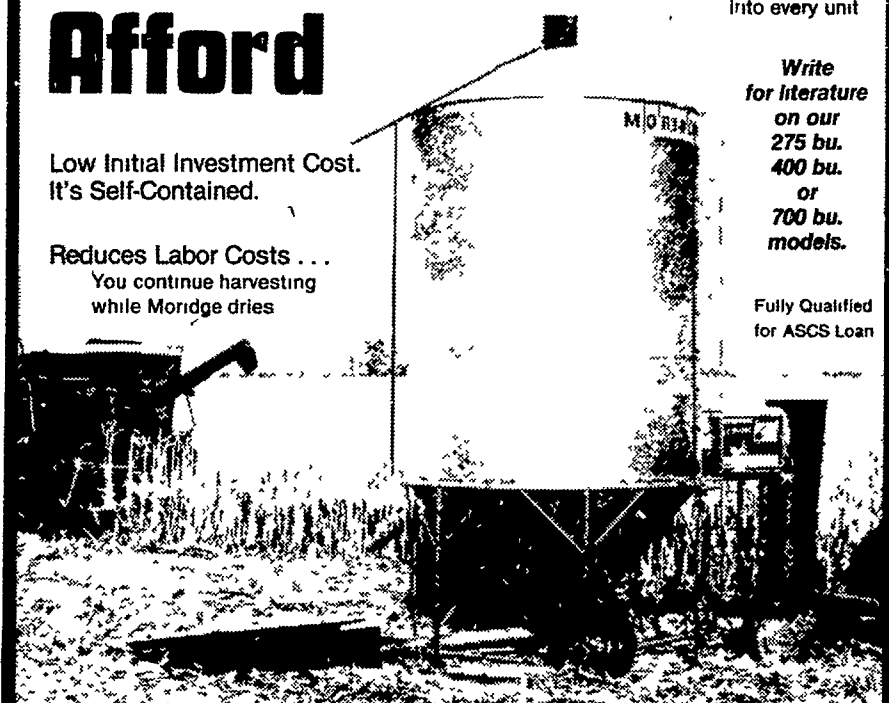

Re-elected second vice

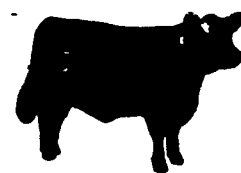
president was Ainsworth W. Sondericker of Attica, NY. He is district 3 director.

Dairyalea is the northeast's largest farm-to-consumer marketer of milk and milk

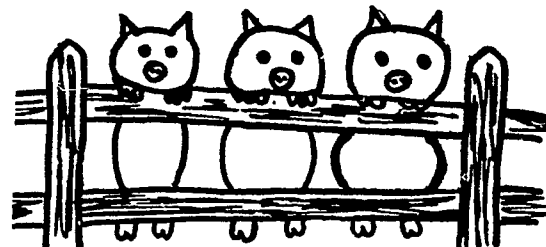
products. In its fiscal year ending March 31, 1979, it handled more than 2.3 billion pounds of farm milk for its members, with net sales of \$389,415,000.
