Local milk quality team competes at nationals

NEW HOLLAND — The Julk Quality and Dairy Foods Contest is one of leven National Agricultural ontests conducted annually by the National FFA Organization as part of the National FFA Convention.

This year 33 teams tested their knowledge of milk quality and dairy foods in a contest that included tests on milk production and marketing, identification of flavors and odors in milk and cottage cheese, identification of hard cheeses, scoring of sediment pads, and identification of milker unit defects.

The contest was one of many educational activities at the National FFA Convention in which FFA members put into practice he lessons taught in the vocational agriculture classroom.

Participants in the Milk Quality and Dairy Foods Contest were given ten samples of bulk milk which has been pasteurized. Each of the samples were visual and taste tested to determine Elavor, odor and sediment content of the milk.

Each team's evaluations of the samples were written

on score sheets and compared to scores determined by contest officials. Scoring was done according to standards by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Each of the teams competed in the Milk Quality and Dairy Foods Contest at other levels before earning the right to compete in the National Contest. As teams progressed to area and state contests, the competition became more difficult.


