

Black Acres Angus sale averages \$782

FREDERICK, Md. — A good crowd was on hand for the first Back Acres Production Sale and Club Calf Sale Friday evening, November 16, at the fairgrounds in Frederick, Maryland.

Guest consignors were Jayhawk Farm, Middletown, Md., Weathering Heights, Frederick, Md., Brookline Farm, Queenstown, Md., Wyndcrest Farm, Ashton, Md., Cool Spring Farm, Hampstead, Md., Joe Cooney, Jr., Westminster, Md., and Folly Fraction Farm, Clarksville, Md.

Eighty-five lots in all went through the ring. Fifty-six female lots and three bulls averaged \$782 and twenty-six steer calves averaged \$536.

Top was lot 2 cow. She brought \$1350 going to Refuge at Odessa, Delaware and her calf by Linebacker of Wye, went to John R. Whaley, Queenstown, Md. The cow was a daughter of Oatland Montague 463 and a Back Acres consignment.

Second top selling lot was lot 4, a Bellemonte bred female that sold to Calvin Murray, Mt. Airy, Md. for \$1325. Her April "Linebacker" heifer calf

went to Kay Wagner, Hampstead, Md.

Several other lots sold over the thousand dollar mark including the lot 11 cow and her D S Sport Marshall 857 steer calf, the lot 22 cow and steer calf, lot 27 and steer calf, lot 29 and heifer calf, all Back Acres consignments; and lot 48, a daughter of Boram of Wye, consigned by Dick Whaley's Brookline Farm, lot 54, a Contact of Wye daughter consigned by the Treadway's Wyndcrest Farm.

Volume buyers were Walter G. Bishop, Jr., Greenwood, South Carolina,

who purchased 14 lots, and Refuge, Odessa, Delaware, with 11 lots. Two of the bulls sold right at \$1000, lot 59, JBC Black Brut 1977, a son of RGA Eileenmere 44, consigned by Joe Cooney, Jr., sold to Roy M. Fuss, Dillsburg, Pennsylvania. Lot 60, Folly Fraction A Memo, consigned by Folly Fraction Farm, Clarksville, Maryland, sold to Deep Cove Farm, Cambridge, Ohio.

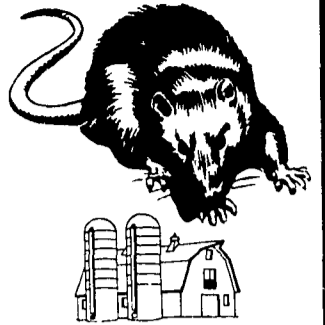
Topping the steers at \$700, was a purebred Angus by Rito 707 of Ideal, selling to Lori Hobbs, Damascus, Maryland.

Second high was another straight Angus going to A. Boyer, Glenwood, Maryland.

Then two calves brought \$650 each, one was a Charolais-Hereford-Simmental cross and the other an Angus-Pinzgauer cross.

The Maryland Angus Association managed the sale and Morris Fannon Pennington Gap, Va., was the auctioneer.

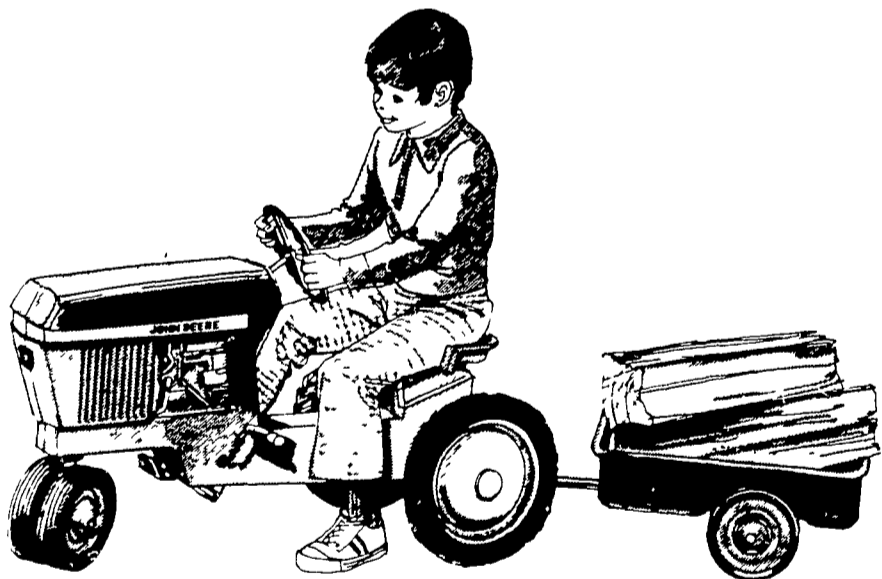
June 16, 1980, at Way-Brite Farms, R. 9, Gettysburg.

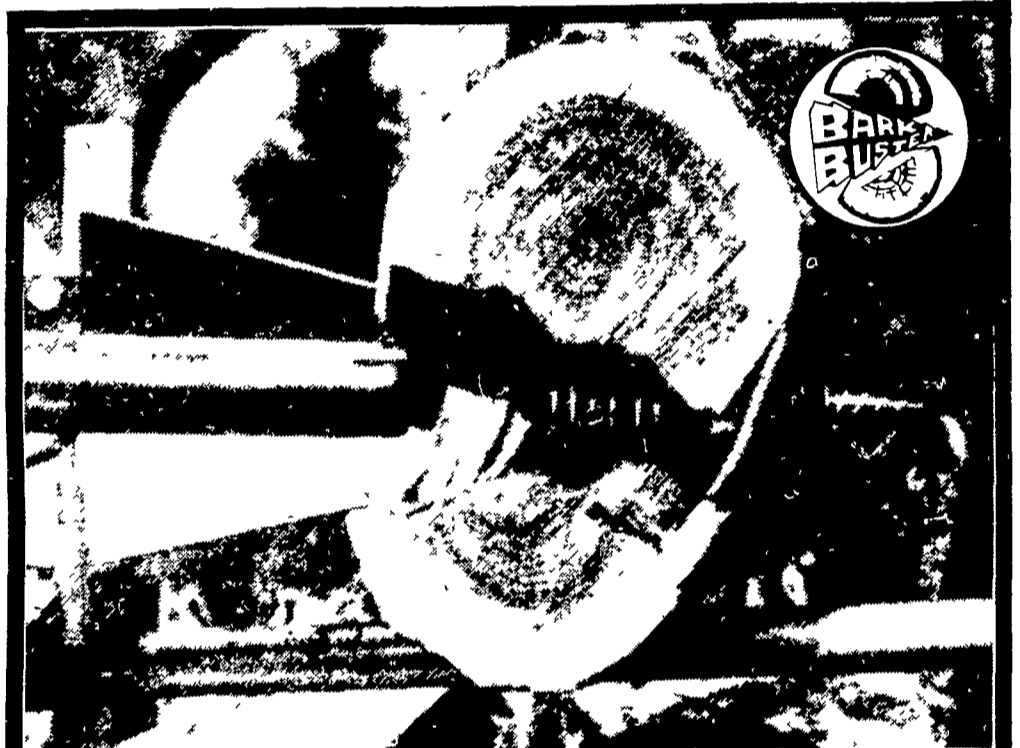
