Young farmer spokesman calls food America's wealth

TOLEDO, Oh10 — "Americans enjoy a bountiful suppy of high quality food not only because of our rich land and climate, but also because of the latest advancements in agricultural research," said Doyle Waybright, Pennsylvania's Young Farmer Spokesman for Agriculture.

"Through research, experimentation and the desire to increase efficiency and productivity of farming, agribusinesses can provide the farmer with the resources necessary to economically produce high quality food and fiber," the Pennsylvania spokesman said.

Waybright, of Gettysburg, reminded his audience at the National Young Farmer Educational Institute, that farmers need modern tools to provide the world with the necessary supply of food.

"Fertilizers help farmers increase crop yield two fold Supplementing the soil with these necessary plant nutrients not only increases the soil but also raises the nutritional value of the crop, improves the soil and helps reduce erosion."

Waybright points out that "pesticides have become increasingly important ... with the use of them you insure a very successful crop and without them there can be a complete loss."

Waybright said the USDA estimates without pesticides 70 percent of the crops would not be grown successfully. If all farmers were to raise only 'organic' food, many of our fruits and vegetables would disappear from the market place.

The spokesman contest in which Waybright participated was developed to help consumers better understand the American Farmer and is sponsored by Elanco Product Company. The Spokesman contest was held during the National Young Farmer Educational Institute in Toldeo.

Waybright said feed additives such as antibiotics, minerals and vitamins, "enable farmers to raise livestock in a healthy condition with the most rapid and efficient gains. Antibiotics used at subtheraputic levels help controls diseases that could lessen animal product output."
