

Carter's trade spokesman to talk at convention

PARK RIDGE, Ill. — The administration's spokesman on matters relating to international trade is a featured speaker at the 61st annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation in Phoenix, January 6-10, 1980.

Ambassador Reubin O'D. Askew, President Carter's new U.S. Trade Representative — a post with ambassadorial and cabinet

rank — will address the general session Tuesday morning, January 8.

A former two-term governor and legislator of Florida, Ambassador Askew succeeded Robert S. Strauss last October. Strauss resigned the post to manage Carter's re-election bid.

A native of Oklahoma, Ambassador Askew has been a resident of Florida

since 1937. An attorney specializing in international business, Ambassador Askew formerly served as chairman of the Nation Governors' Conference, chairman of the President's Advisory Board on Ambassadorial Appointments and chairman of the Select Commission on Immigration and Refugee Policy.

Other principal speakers

scheduled to address the Farm Bureau general sessions include Sir Nicholas Henderson, Great Britain's new ambassador to the United States; and noted economist, Dr. Murray Weidenbaum, director of the Center for the Study of American Business at Washington University St. Louis and former assistant secretary of the treasury.

Dr. Joyce Brothers, prominent psychologist and broadcast media personality, will address the Women's Conference.

Comedian Bob Hope will be featured at the annual recognition and awards program, January 8.

Record \$111,000 paid for Angus bull calf

LITTLETON, Colo. — A California Angus breeder paid \$111,000 for an Angus bull calf at a cattle auction in Colorado recently to establish a new Angus breed record.

It is the highest price ever

paid at an auction for an Angus calf.

The bull, Ken Caryl Ironsides 0489, was bred and owned by Ken Caryl Ranch, Littleton, Colorado, and sold at auction at the ranch. The buyers were Buck and

Barbara Stevens, Point Reyes, California. The contending bidder was an Angus breeder from Argentina.

The young, trim bull calf was born on January 3, 1979.

On the day of the sale, when he was about 10 months and two weeks old, he weighed 895 pounds. He will remain temporarily at Ken Caryl ranch and will be shown in the open Angus show at the National Western Stock Show in Denver on January 15.

The previous top price for an Angus bull calf was \$110,000 paid for Cracker Jack Baros 1119, bred and owned by Erdmann Angus Ranch, Wetonka, South Dakota, in their recent production sale.

Buyers of that calf were Cottonwood Angus Farms, Pipestone, Minnesota; Frey Angus Ranch, Granville, North Dakota; and Kadence Angus Ranch, St. Ignatius, Montana.

Higher prices have been paid for mature Angus bulls at auction. These records are for calves, that have yet to produce any offspring.

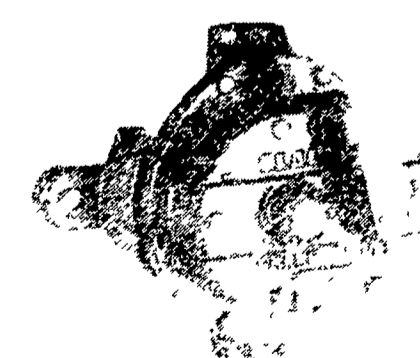
