Look at total food system not parts, marketer says

FRESNO, Calif. — The well-being of the U.S. total food production and distribution system, rather than the vitality of any of its components parts, should be the focus of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's "Structure of Agriculture" meetings, a livestock

marketing spokesman said here last week.

Richard L. Nook, president of the Kansas City-based Livestock Marketing Association, also said this "amazingly efficient food production and distribution system...is fueled by an intangible factor that would

never show up on any graphic charting of the structure of agriculture, the factor of individual enterprise."

Nook, a rancher and marketing businessman said the challenge to government and agriculture organizational leaders is to maintain the current "massive, remarkably productive, highly responsive food production and distribution system," he said at a Structure of Agriculture session.

The "beauty" of the current system, "if it is functioning in a climate that allows it to be productive, responsive and efficient, is that it is self-improving," he said.

In explaining the complexity of the food production and distribution system, LMA has coined the term, "Food Sphere," Nook testified. The "Food Sphere" includes "every size and type of business — as well as every person who owns or is employed by them — that manufactures a product or provides a service of any kind that is necessary in

operating a food production, processing, distribution or marketing business."

The sphere also includes the consumer, he said, "not only as the ultimate buyer of food, but as the ultimate creator of public policy — the social and economic policy within which food production and distribution functions."

Because each part of the sphere cooperates with, and is dependent upon, many other parts of the sphere, the viability of the entire system "must take precedence", Nock said.

Finally, he said, government's role in the structure "must be based upon a recognition of the limitations of its responsibility."

"Our view is that government's role in American agriculture must be, quite simply, to support the existence of a viable food production and distribution system...I would hope that no one is laboring under the misconception that it is the Department of Agriculture's responsibility to determine what that structure will be, let alone to implement any given change" in the structure.

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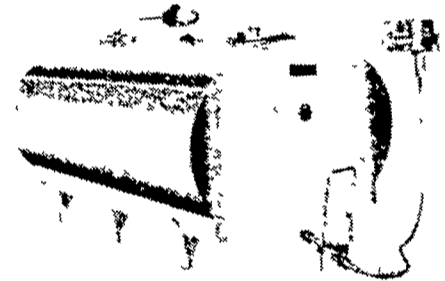
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
