## Northumberland youth wins Star Farmer award

HARRISBURG - An 18year-old Northumberland County youth was named FFA State Star Farmer for 1980. Jeffery A. Martz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Byron A. Martz of R1, Dalmatia, received the award at the Pennsylvania FFA's 51st Mid-Winter Convention in the Forum of the Education Building, held here in conjunction with the 64th Annual Pennsylvania State Farm Show. This is the highest agriculture award possible through the Pennsylvania Future Farmers of America.

- Jeffery is a graduate of the Line Mountain High School and a member of the Mahantango FFA Chapter. He farms 85 acres of corn and 22 acres of alfalfa, and as 38 head of milk cows and 43 heifers. Jeffery served as president of his local chapter

for two years and as vicepresident of the S.U.N. Area FFA.

The State Star Farmer Award puts Jeffery in the running for additional hours later this year. He will represent Pennsylvania in September for the title of Star Farmer of the North Atlantic Region, against similar winners from the sixteen northern states.

Competing against Jeffery this year for the FFA State Star Farmer title were:






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
