BREINIGSVILLE — The Lehigh Valley 4-H Dairy Goat Club is in the process of reorganizing for 1980.

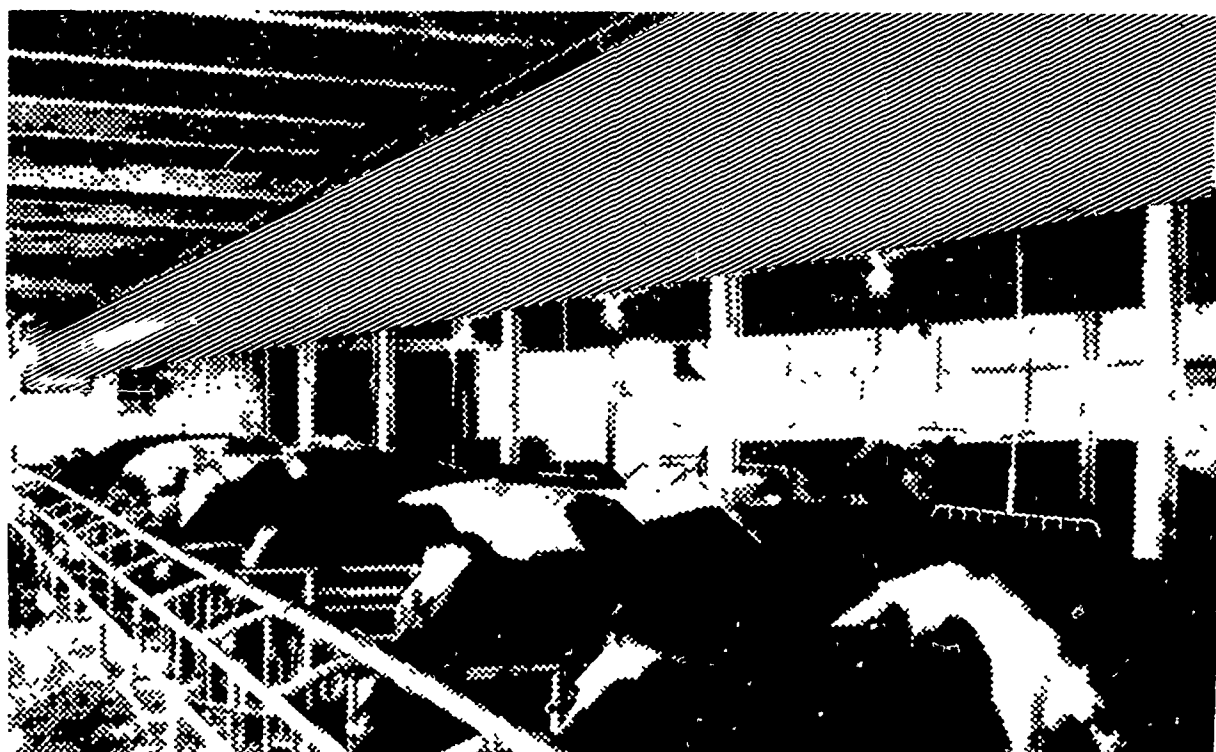
Club members with ideas for this year's projects should contact club president, Brenda Mengel, before January 28th. This is the date club officers and leaders are going to set up the club events for 1980.

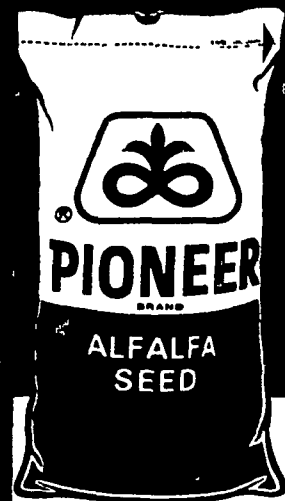
