

Regional soybean growers to meet February 14

OCEAN CITY, Md. — Results of production research to increase soybean profits and a look at soybean markets for the coming year will be featured topics of discussion at the 14th Delmarva Soybean

meeting held in cooperation with the Mid-Atlantic Soybean Association annual meeting at Convention Hall in Ocean City on February 14.

The meeting, which gets

underway at 8:30 a.m. with registration and time to visit exhibits of seed and chemical suppliers, is open to all soybean growers in Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania.

Kenneth L. Bader, chief

executive officer of the American Soybean Association in St. Louis, will be the keynote speaker during the afternoon session.

In addition to reviewing

current ASA research and market development activities, Bader will report to soybean producers on initiatives made by the American Soybean Association to soften the blow of the recent embargo on Soviet grain and soybean purchases.

Other speakers on the day long program include James Durphey of North Carolina State University who will discuss soybean row spacing and planting interaction; Dale Hathaway, Undersecretary of Agriculture for International Affairs and Commodity Development who will speak on the future of world soybean trade; and a joint presentation by Lee Hellman of the University of Maryland and Henry Wilson of Virginia Truck and Ornamentals Research Station on agricultural chemicals for weed and insect control. Following a luncheon and additional time to visit exhibits, soybean growers

will hear a representative of the Maryland Crop Improvement Association discuss the Maryland Soybean Checkoff and what it means to soybean producers.

"Watch Your LD 50" will be the topic of discussion for Ron Jester of the University of Delaware and Gary Smith of the University of Maryland.

The production information program will conclude by 3:30 p.m. at which time the Mid-Atlantic Soybean Association will hold a short business meeting chaired by Mid-Atlantic Soybean Association President William Bradley of Salisbury, Maryland.

Farmers association holds legal meeting

WILLOW STREET — The womens committee of the Lancaster County Farmers' Association sponsored a legal guidelines seminar for farm families here Wednesday.

Richard Dennison of the Pennsylvania Farmers Association legal service was the speaker.

Eighty-four farm folks attended the meeting.

Many farm families have been asking for more information and help with legal questions and legal problems.

The major financial planning problems facing Lancaster County farmers these days are estate planning, personal finance, property rights, land use and land development, zoning, tax-free exchanges, gifts, leases and so forth.

These, plus many other questions which the members raised, were discussed at the meeting.

Dennison enlightened the audience how PFA's legal service can help and has been working to assist farm families with their legal problems.

The service, which began in 1976, is the first legal service for farm families in the United States.

The legal guidelines program is designed as a pioneer educational program. It proposes to help the farm family learn about its legal rights and legal opportunities.

The program will study general legal principles but it will also offer practical answers to everyday questions.

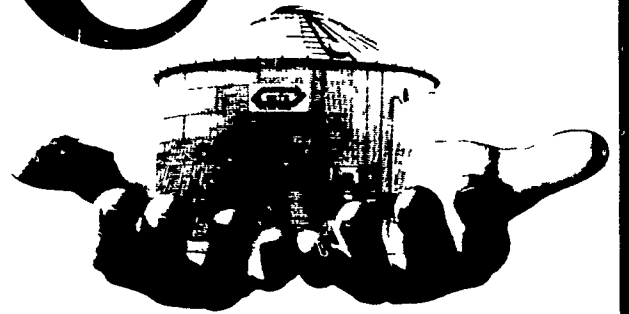
