Lawrence Specht, Extension dairy specialist, points out that the conference will start at 1 p.m. on March 6 and end at noon the second day. Sessions will be held in the University's J.O. Keller Building.

A conference registration fee includes all costs of instruction, instructional materials, and banquet, Specht points out.

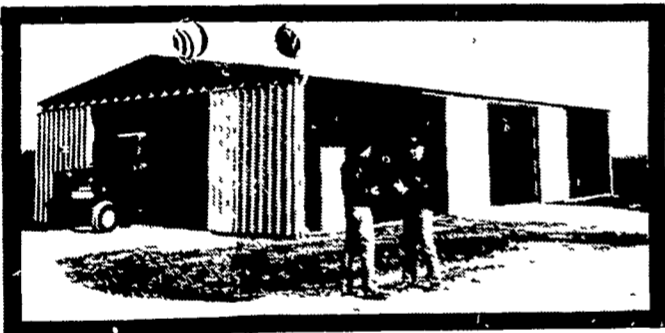
