SCS tells how to maintain drains

LEBANON — Sediment trapped in subsurface drainage systems drains money from your pocket says Fred Suffian, Soil Conservationist. Water standing a few days in low lying croplands will reduce yields cutting income and land values.

According to Suffian, you know your subsurface drains are working if water remains on your field for only a short time after a heavy rain. If properly installed, those drains will function well for many years.

Most failures can be prevented by regular care. Maintenance practices such as cleaning trash and removing sediment, clearing drainage outlets, and con-

trolling tree roots should be performed at least twice a year.

Surface inlet covers often seal with trash while their basins fill with slit. Clean inlet covers and clean basins when they are clogged. If a cover is left off and/or the basin fills the line may clog.

Drain outlets may fail because the outlet ditch becomes too shallow, causing a backup in the line. A minimum free-fall of ½ foot should be maintained from the bottom of the drain outlet to the bottom of the ditch or stream.

Roots of nearby trees may grow into subsurface drains causing the lines to block. A tree root zone is about the same size as its crown diameter, therefore, cut tree as necessary.
