Call in questions to political candidates

WASHINGTON, D.C. — "Campaign 80: what are the major farm issues?"

Farmers are invited to help answer this important question by participating in the nation's first "National Farm Issues Primary", being sponsored by the Agriculture Council of America.

This unique program features a special bank of 25 toll-free WATS lines that will be available to people anywhere in the continential U.S. on Wednesday, February 20th between 6 and 11 p.m. (Central Time). Anyone can participate by calling ACA's toll-free number (800/821-5401).

All the major presidential candidates from the Democratic and Republican parties have been invited to participate or be represented on the panel that will monitor the toll-free phones and speak directly with callers.

Each caller will be asked to respond to an "issues" questionnaire so that information can be systematically collected, tabulated and analyzed.

The "Primary" is being sponsored by ACA to explore

how individual farmers, ranchers and farm-related businessmen view major issues in the 1960 campaign. The program kicks-off ACA's Annual Membership Meeting, being held at the Crown Center Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri, February 20-22nd.

"In light of recent international developments, agriculture issues now rank among the foremost on our national agenda", commented ACA chairman Chris Jouflas, a sheep rancher from Grand Junction, Colorado.

"We think it'll be extremely valuable to identify how farmers and ranchers – the people most directly affected by these developments – feel about these and other national issues."

Results of the call-in will be discussed at a special briefing scheduled for the morning of February 21st. All participating candidates will be given an opportunity to comment on the findings.

The basic technique being applied to the Primary has been pioneered by ACA in programs called the "Farm Line" and "Washington on the line". Their purpose is to bring top decision-makers and experts closer to the people affected by their decisions.

ACA has coordinated these programs on many occasions over the past six years involving prominent national leaders from the Administration, the U.S. Congress, and leading representatives of the news media. Grassroots response has been generated from every one of the 48 continential states.

ACA cautions callers that although 25 WATS lines will be in operation an extremely high level of public participation is expected. Anyone reaching a busy signal during the program is advised to wait for a short period of time before dialing again.
