less uniform in size and shape, but the resulting reduction in processing costs could mean savings for consumers.

The proposals would also drop alternative grade names, such as "U.S. Fancy" and "U.S. Extra Standard," and keep the single-letter, sequential grade names U.S. A, B and C. The proposed change conforms with USDA's policy of uniform grade names for all processed fruits and vegetables, Foreman said.

Under the proposed grade . standards, frozen brussels

sprouts would be graded on the basis of their color, blemishes, quality of trimming and extraneous vegetable trimmings present in the finished product.
