Agribusiness truckers attend defensive driving seminar

CAMP HILL - A defensive driving program which has been shown to reduce both the number and the severity of truck accidents was held here last week.

Sponsored by PennAg Industries Association, the day-long program was attended by 58 agribusiness drivers representing many of the association's member firms. PennAg is a trade association representing some 400 agribusinesses in Pennsylvania.

Richard Charles, safety manager for Agway, Inc., was the course instructor. Agway, the Northeast farmer cooperative, is the nation's fourth largest private truck carrier, according to Charles, with some 4000 vehicles and 3700

The firm has had formal driver training programs for

drivers.

more than a quarter of a century, and enjoys an accident rate considerably lower than that of most

According to Charles, Agway drivers averaged 9.89 accidents per million miles last year, compared to 12.10 million miles for all fleet vehicles

Every Agway driver must complete the defensive driver training course when he joins the company. Beginning this year, Charles said, each driver will be retrained about once every three years. The program, he noted, has cut down not

only on Agway's accident rate, but on the cost per accident, as well.

Over the last five years, Agway's average cost per accident has declined by \$250 in spite of soaring costs for labor and repair parts.

The training session for PennAg members was the second one offered by the association, according to Ralph Getkin, chairman of the PennAg Education Committee. He said they were pleased with the strong interest shown in this year's program, and that it would continue to be an annual event.



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
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
