Judging team members honored Max Smith with a gardener's certificate and Gary Dean with a wooden clock for the contributions of time to the club.

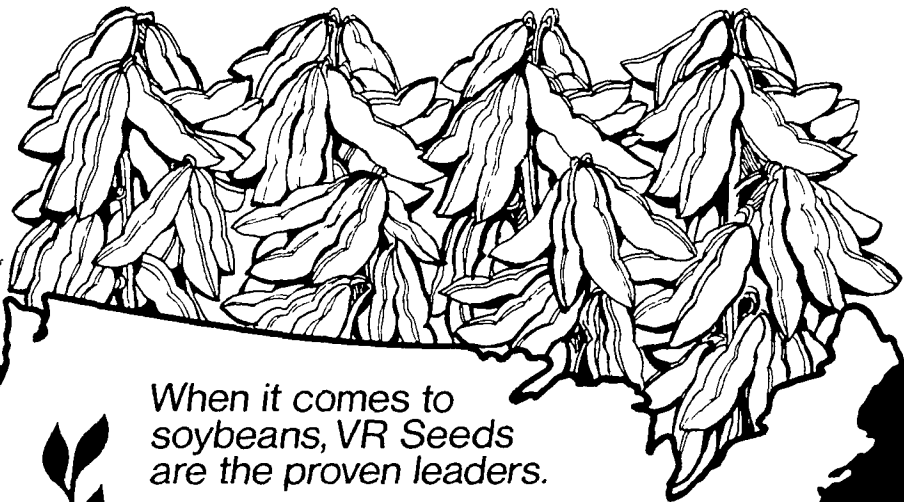
Because of its growing membership, this may be the last year of combined work with the Beef Club for the 4-H Sheep Club.

## Poultry meeting series begins

LANCASTER — The Lancaster County Cooperative Extension Service will begin a series of educational poultry meetings on Thursday, February 14.

The meetings have been developed by the Lancaster County Poultrymen and Extension to help fellow farmers prepare for the 1980's.

The first meeting will concern the topic of fowl hysteria, its causes, con-

sequences, and prevention. The speaker will be Dr. H. B. Graves, a poultry scientist from Penn State.

Fred Pontz, vice-president of Grimes Poultry Processing Corporation, will be discussing domestic and interational markets for U.S. broilers. And, William Patterson, general manager of Weaver Quality Eggs, will talk to the group on marketing the processed egg.

The meeting will be held at

the Farm and Home Center, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The second meeting in the series will be held on February 28, with the final meeting scheduled for March 13. Pest control and poultry diseases, and gasohol production and manure management in the cropping program will be the topics of concern at the future meetings
