Six national FFA officers tour Japan

ALEXANDRIA, Va. -The six National Officers of the Future Farmers of America (FFA) will return tomorrow from their nowannual international tour of Japan. For the second time in as many years, the trip was funded by Mitsui & Co., Ltd., a large Japanese trading firm.

The young officers visited businesses and industries, the American Embassy, farms and a high school vocational agricultural department. The trip was made possible by the full sponsorship of Mitsui
