she said, "is a long, tedious job." The abrasive can be used with either oil or water (or spit). While mineral oil is sometimes suggested, Letie said ordinary salad oil is just as acceptable. "You need a lubricant and you use your fingers for rubbing. It's dirty job." First the finger is dipped in oil; then in rottenstone While the whole process is slow, Letie said


the results will happen slower with oil than with water. "You're rubbing away the top layer of finish. Go with the grain.'

A great deal of work will result in the removal of the white mark. She cautioned that once the white mark is removed the rest of the surface of the wood may require some work with a cleaner-conditioner to restore it to its proper finish.

She pointed out that the cleaner-conditioner recommended will go a long way toward filling in tiny cracks which appear in furniture finish from hard use. She added that for serious cleaning of furniture, a mixture of half gum turpentine and half linseed oil may be used following the method described for the cleaner-conditioner.
