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USDA says meat graders must wear white frocks

WASHINGTON, DC. -The U.S. Department of Agriculture has amended meat grading regulations to require that meat graders and their supervisors wear clean, white frocks, effective July 1.

Meat graders, as well as butchers and other plant personnel, customarily wear frocks. The amendment assures the maintenance of sanitary standards by making clean, white frocks mandatory for graders and their supervisors while they are working with meat, said Carol Tucker Forman, assissecretary of tant agriculture.

Following adoption of this regulation, provision will be made under the Federal Employees Uniform Allowance Act to reimburse employees for the cost of their uniforms.

Twenty-six of the 29 comments received after the amendment was proposed last October were favorable. Copies of the amendment


