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Camden County 4-H youth learn pet care

CLEMENTON — Boys and girls in Camden County can experience the joys of owning and caring for a small animal through the 4-H pet care project.

Last year in New Jersey more than 23,000 youth participated in an animal care program.

With pets, members are provided with materials that guide them in selecting and caring for their own pets, and with information on the background, habits and activities of cats, dogs, fish, birds, hamsters and many other small animals.

Participants in the project learn to house, feed, handle, groom and give general care to their pets. In spending time with the animals they can develop responsibility, patience, understanding and sensitivity to the needs of living things.



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
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
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
