## Senator blocks move to limit price support loans

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Senator Herman E. Talmadge, chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry, succeeded in removing a provision from the 1981 budget resolution that would have placed severe restrictions on future farm price support programs.

On Wednesday, May 8 the Senate unanimously approved an amendment offered by Talmadge to exempt farm price support loans and related programs

from a provision in the Senate version of the budget resolution that would make all government loan programs authorized by law dependent on separate and annual appropriations by Congress.

Farm price support loans are not now subject to the appropriations process but, when authorized by Congress, are made as necessary to producers by the Commodity Credit Corporation of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. CCC crop loans have been

the government's principal mechanism for supporting farm prices since the 1930s.

Talmadge told the Senate the proposal of the Senaie Budget Committee to make such crop loans subject to the Congressional appropriations process would 'cause a fundamental shift in our agricultural price support programs and result in an administrative nightmare."

"If the appropriations committee appropriated less money than needed to carry out commodity price support

levels, a number of questions would immediately arise: Who receives the loans and support loans while corn the secretary of agriculture guarantee be required to prorate the funds available for making loans?"

loans at the authorized and that his amendment "would not increase the 1981 budget one dollar.'

The Talmadge amendment would exempt from the loan provisions of the budget resolution agricultural price support and related programs of the type in operation on January 1, 1980, which are funded through the Commodity Credit Corporation.






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
