LIMA — Wood ashes should not be used on established turf or for topdressing on a garden advises James McKeehen, Delaware Co. agrıcultural agent.

They can be of benefit if they are applied and tilled into the soil when establishing a new lawn or garden, and will help to

reduce the acidity of the soil as well as provide potash.

Light applications would not harm a lawn, but would not be of much benefit either. In addition, they would be difficult to spread evenly and if children or pets play in the lawn they would track the ashes into the house.



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
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
