Herbert L. Forest, dairy official with the Agricultural Marketing Service, said the hearing will convene at 9:30 a.m. at the Best Western Thruway Motel, 1375 Washington Avenue, Albany, N.Y. Principal cities in the market order area include

> Forest pointed out that the proposed amendments that will be heard would increase transportation the allowances for milk handlers to reflect more nearly the cost of assembling milk from dairy farms and transporting it to plants for processing.

The hearing was requested by the North Atlantic Milk Processor's Association, which includes a number of the handlers regulated under the New York-New Jersey

marketing order.

It was also announced by Forest that interested persons have until June 13 to submit additional proposals relating to a possible expansion of the New York-New Jersey and Middle Atlantic order areas to include several unregulated counties in Pennsylvania. Cooperative associations in the two markets have proposed an enlargement of the regulated marketing areas.

The market expansion proposals are being held for possible consideration at a

later joint hearing. Additional proposals on this matter should be sent to the Deputy Administrator, AMS, USDA, Washington, D.C. 20250.

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland today said the U.S. Department of Agriculture plans to play a major role in the national effort to reduce cancer incidence by preventing or minimizing

exposure to cancer-causing agents.

"Historically, USDA has conducted research, education and animal and plant health protection programs in service to the agricultural community,' Bergland said. "We will continue to fulfill that responsibility.

"However, USDA also recognizes its equally important responsibility to the public health. Under federal meat, poultry and egg products inspection mandates. USDA cooperates with other federal agencies to establish common principles for identifying and regulating cancer-causing substances," Bergland said

Through the Irragency Regulatory Liaison Group, Bergland said, the federal agencies responsible for

developing the criteria for identifying carcinogens and assessing their human risks. USDA's Food Safety and

Quality Service is a member of this group. USDA supports the findings and the policies of this interagency group, Bergland said.

Bergland said he was


