## Farm museum to sponsor rural crafts show

**HAVRE DE GRACE, Md.** — Steppingstone Museum, a farm complex in Harford County, Maryland, and arranged as a turn-of-the-century rural home and crafts shops, will present its tenth annual Old-Time Arts and Crafts Festival on Saturday, June 21, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, June 22, noon to 5 p.m.

The museum, a non-profit organization, staffed by volunteers, is dedicated to the historic preservation of our country's past. It is located on a picturesque hillside, overlooking the Susquehanna River State Park, near Havre de Grace.

Fifty artists and craftspersons will demonstrate and exhibit such old-time crafts as spinning and weaving, quilting, rug hooking, broom and shingle making, chair caning, soap making, basket weaving, slate scrimshaw, pottery making, tinsmithing, woodworking, various kinds of needlework, artists

painting on all types of media, to name only a few.

The blacksmith shop will be ablaze when the "smithy" will create old-time items needed from that craft.

Members of the Steppingstone Museum Association will be on hand to guide visitors through the buildings where they may view the thousands of artifacts of the outstanding collection of craftsmen's tools in the shops of the copper, leatherworker, woodworker, tinsmith, and others, and also see home appliances, fine handwork, dolls and toys of the past century.

Entertainment each day will be Square Dancing, Barbershop and Bluegrass Singing, a German Band and other events.

To reach Steppingstone, take Md. Rt. 155 to Earlton Road and follow the signs to the Museum on Quaker Bottom Road. Donation is \$1 for adults, 25 cents, children.
