Hog market brightens producers' outlooks®

LITITZ — Hog producers this week are in high spirits. For the first time in a long while, the prices they received for their market hogs were up close to 40 cents.

Like Pennsylvania Pork Producer Council's president Abe Fisher, Kinzers, said, "We're not making any money yet, but we're not losing as much as we were before."

Fisher attributes the better hog market to the number of hogs killed falling

"On Thursday, the kill was down to 341,000," he said "The supply of hogs has seemed to drop off."

This improvement, however, may be short lived Fisher attributed the lower supply being the result of the recent good weather "When the days are cool and the hogs are growing well, the market is kept cleared out.


"But if we get two weeks of real hot weather, and the hogs don't gain fast enough, we'll see a lot more hogs coming on to the market at the same time."

Henry Gruber, chief of livestock procurement for A & B Packing, Allentown, echoed Fisher's theory. He also noted there just were the number of hogs moving through the sale barns.

"When the supply of hogs drops, and these packers are set up for the big kill, the buyers fight for the hogs available—that means higher prices."

Despite the fact that there is an almost sure drop in hog prices lurking on the horizon, Fisher said the better prices this week are "tremendous".

"We hog producers are smiling from ear to ear," he concluded



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
