Talking with Lancaster Farming, Dickerson said the association is planning a weekend symposium for June 28 to be held at North Platte, Nebraska. The participants will hear the latest information on marketing and performance, and will be visiting some of the leading farms in the area.

Dickerson noted that the Charolais breed is going through a culling out

process. He said the rapid growth the breed experienced in the late 1960's has leveled off. "The breed has gone past the exotic stage," he commented.

He added that he feels the merits of the Charolais cattle are in their fast rate of gain—performance

"They are efficient feed converters, and produce a greater percentage of red meat through their large size. For the commercial cattlemen, Charolais offer a heavier weaning weight—50 pounds per calf, on the average—which means more pounds for their dollar investment. That's why commercial producers are crossbreeding with Charolais more and more."

Concerning the trend toward the larger market steers, Dickerson said he believes the heavier, more-meat carcasses will be marketable in time—whether the individual consumer is ready now is questionable.

"I think that the wants and needs of the consumer are reflected throughout the beef chain... cattlemen breed what the consumer wants. And right now they are telling us they don't want fat.

"In projecting the consumers' desires over the next ten years, we feel they will be picking Charolais for lean meat. We hope we're not like the automobile industry and reading the market all wrong—making Cadillacs while the consumer wants compacts

"Only time will tell. But,

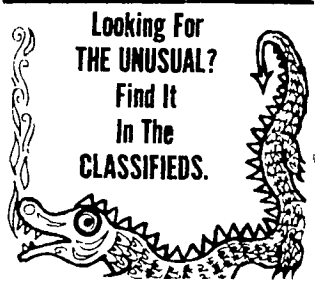

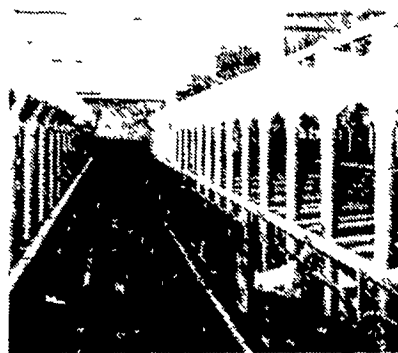

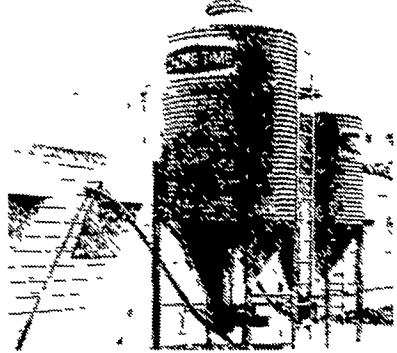
