Todd Dawes of Urbana, Indiana, earned the Premier, Breeder Award. This honor is given to the breeder of the three highest placing heifers in individual classes of the show.

Ohio exhibitors teamed up to enter the champion group of five heifers, and took home \$100 for their state Junior Angus group Alabama youths put




together the second place group and received \$75. Kentucky exhibitors took \$50 for third place, and Indiana youths claimed fourth place
