Bev smiled and said then she will be helping to milk more — once her dad and brother teach her how to tell when the cow has been milked out.

"They've already started trying to teach me, but I still have a hard time telling. They say, 'Feel the bag' or 'Squeeze the rubber tube'. So I squeeze and then guess."

Bev, who will be a senior at Annville-Cleona High School this coming Fall has strong feelings about the family farm.

Although her respon-

sibilities there limited her school activities (she sighed and said she would have enjoyed being on the track team), Bev said she loves living on the farm.

"The advantages of living on a farm far outweigh the disadvantages. Farm children are taught responsibility.

"My sisters Brenda, Audrey, and Ann, and my brother, Bryan, and I got to see our parents working hard under pressure. It made our family closer —

growing up and working together."

Looking into their family farm's future, Bev said Bryan will be given the farm. But, even if the future of the farm were to rest in her hands, she said it would stay in farmland.

"I get upset when I see farmland going into housing. I hope to someday have a farm where my kids will be raised."

In her reign as Lebanon County's dairy princess, Bev said she hopes to use their family farm as an extension of her work. "Our farm is an opportunity — I can use it to

promote milk and demonstrate the joy of growing up on a farm."

When asked what her favorite dairy product was, Bev couldn't decide. So, she picked three — yogurt, cheese and ice cream.

Answering the question on what her favorite breed of cattle was took less than a second. "Holstein" she said emphatically.

With her background and enthusiasm about the dairy industry and the products she represents, Lebanon County dairy farmers can be proud of this year's dairy princess, Bev Burkholder.

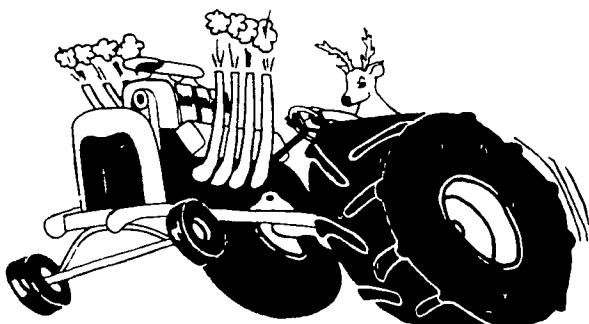
