Wilbur Miller, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, told **Lancaster Farming** he was expecting more opposition and arguments from the floor after the supervisors made their unanimous decision to deny the request. He said he brought the topic up twice and asked for any remarks, but none were made.

"The zoning will stay as it is," he said, and pointed out both the planning commission and the supervisors were in agreement.

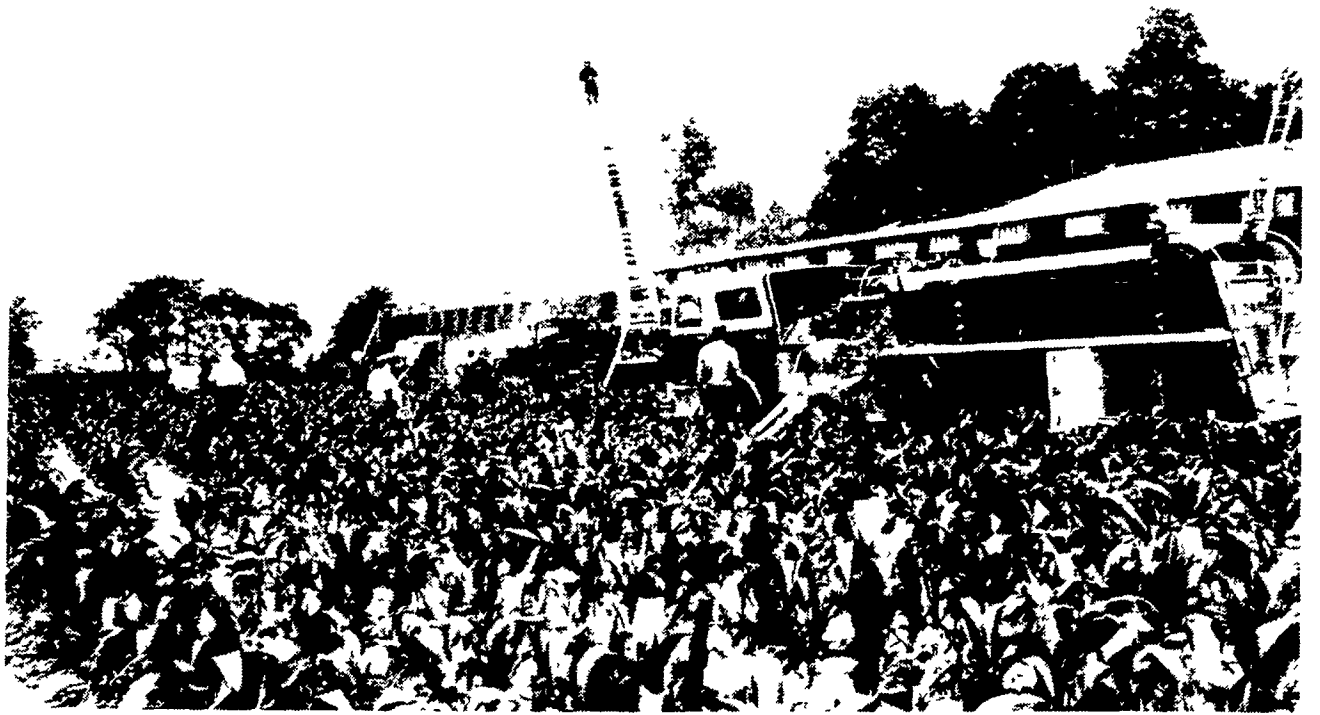
Miller added he was surprised that the attorneys for the Reigles and the
