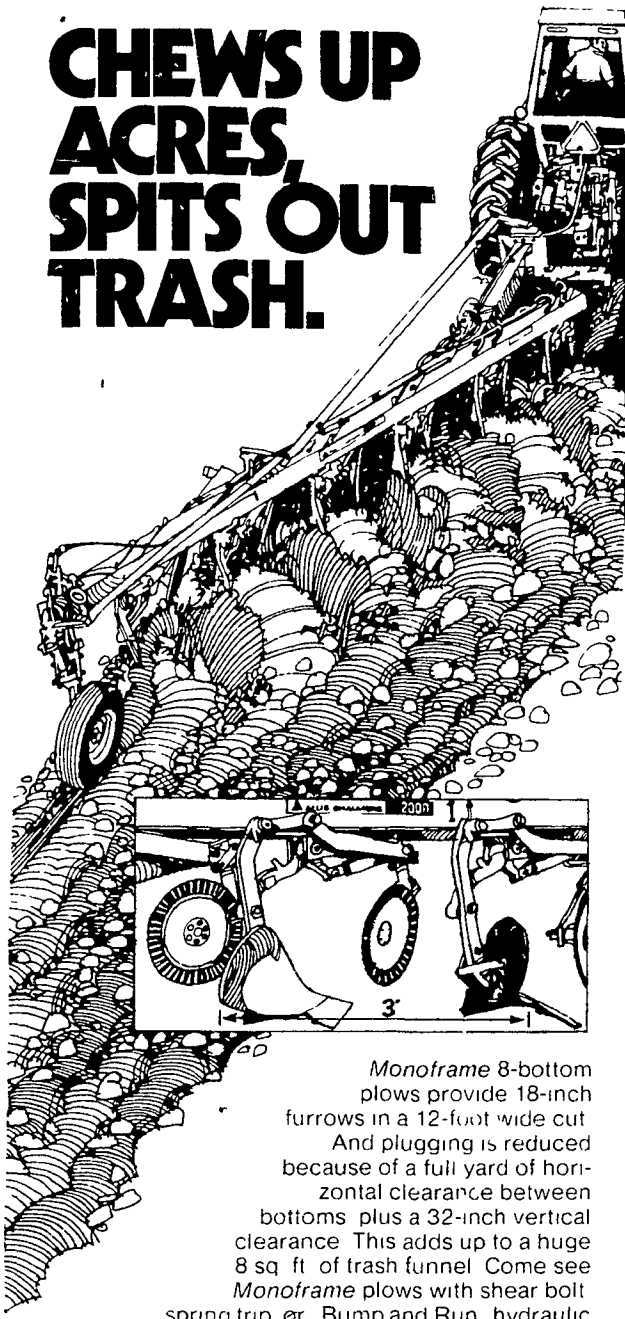


# CHEWS UP ACRES, SPITS OUT TRASH.

## Sterling Brook Farm to host ag board picnic

PITTSOWN, NJ — The Farmers'-Businessmen's Picnic of Hunterdon County is scheduled for Thursday, July 31, at Sterling Brook Farm, three miles west of Pittstown on county route 513

This is an annual and very popular event of the Hunterdon County Board of Agriculture.

Formerly the Barrie Farm, Sterling Brook Farm has been in operation in Hunterdon for about a year,

reports William Groah, Pittstown, chairman for the affair. It is an outstanding farm devoted to the breeding of the Standardbred horse.

It is a foaling farm, where mares give birth to extremely well-bred youngsters destined for competition at the track. A number of thoroughbred mares are also involved in the foaling operation.

The farm is owned by A. J. Taub of East Orange. It is one of several farms, located in a number of states, involved in the Taub horse breeding operation.

Dr. Dennis Milne, noted veterinarian specializing in equines and particularly race horses, is in partnership with Taub in the horse breeding endeavor. Dr. Milne manages Sterling Brook farm along with other responsibilities in the overall operation.

In response to the question of why the Hunterdon location for the foaling farm, Dr. Milne indicates that the search was conducted in many states. But they settled on the Alexandria Township location, the

former Barrie Farm, because it had all the requisites for an excellent foaling farm.

Rolling terrain, excellent soil and climate to support lush grass for the extensive pastures needed, excellent location as farm as transportation was concerned.

"It's ideal for our purposes," he said.

Tours of the farm and facilities will be held between 6 and 7 p.m. Picnic supper is set for 7, says chairman Groah. Speaker on the program, in addition to Dr. Milne, will be John Berry, associated with the Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association of New Jersey. An excellent and noted speaker, his main theme will stress the value and impact of the horse industry on agriculture in New Jersey.
