Order 4 June base pegged at \$13.08

ALEXANDRIA, Va. Middle Atlantic Order Market Administrator Joseph D. Shine Thursday announced a June 1980 base milk price of \$13.08 per hundredweight and an excess milk price of \$11.52. The weighted average

June price is \$12.90 and the butterfat differential for the month is 16.0 cents.

The June base milk price is down one cent from May 1980 but is 91 cents higher than last June.

Order 4 prices are announced for 3.5 percent milk f.o.b. plant location within 55 miles of Philadelphia, and also within 75 miles from the nearer of Washington, DC or Baltimore, MD. There is a 6cent direct-delivery differential applicable to producer milk received at plants located within 55 miles of Philadelphia.

Shine said producer receipts totaled 462.6 million pounds during June, a decrease of 4.1 percent from the previous month, on a






