They will join with several hundred farm couples from throughout the United States to share facts, opinions, and insights about cooperatives and their role in the strength of the business enterprise system.

The two are sponsored by the Southeast Farm Credit Associations which serve farmer members and communities in this region. The conference is sponsored by the American Institute of Cooperation, Pennsylvania Association of Farmer Cooperatives, and Penn State's College of Agriculture.

Conference participants will join with cooperative

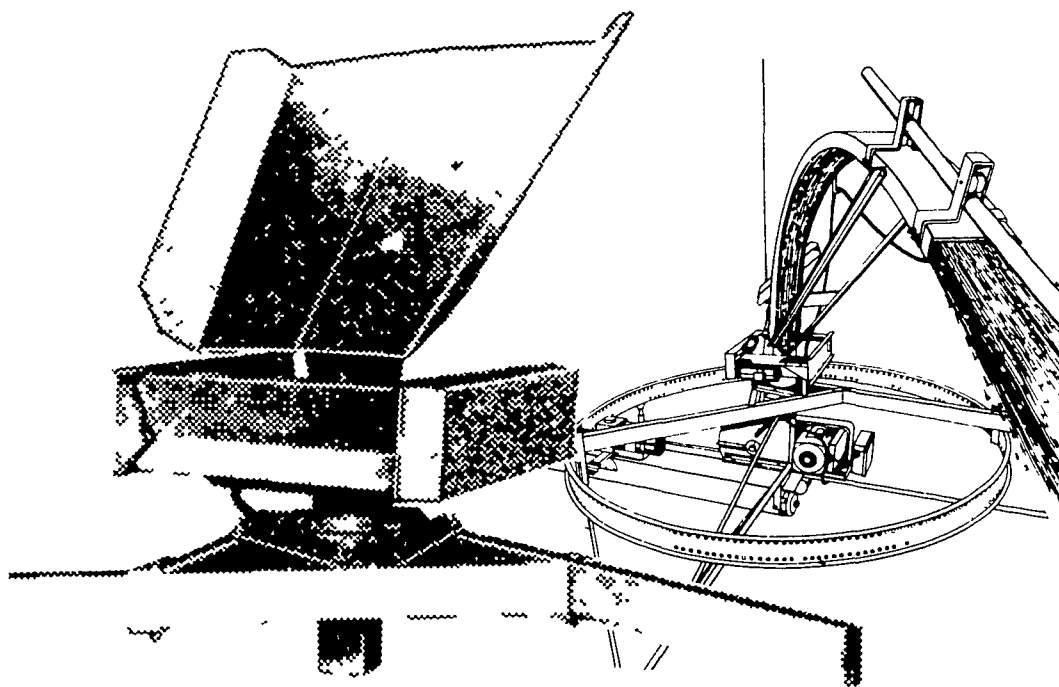
leaders to relate current issues vital to farm leaders, cooperatives, and the community.

Topics of interest to young farm couples at NICE include Governmental Climate for Cooperatives in the 1980's; Cooperatives — Keystone of Agriculture; Implications for Future Planning in Export Marketing, Cooperative Financing, and Market Structure; Mergers; and reactions young farmers have to these and other issues.

The national conference will attract about 2500 cooperative leaders, youth, educators, and farmer cooperative members.
