# Farmers have until Aug. 18 to comment on dairy supports

LITITZ - The public has until August 18 to comment on the level of price support for milk for the 1980-81 marketing year which begins October 1, said Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Jim Williams.

Williams said USDA also is asking for public comment on the prices and terms of purchase by Commodity Credit Corporation of butter, cheese and nonfat dry milk.

Current law requires the milk price support be established at between 80 and 90 percent of parity on October 1 each year. USDA officials estimate the minimum level of support (80 percent of parity) will be \$12.73 per hundredweight on October 1 for milk of 3.5 percent butterfat content.

This would be an increase of 66 cents over the support price which became effective on April 1. It could result in a 5 to 6 cent-pergallon increase in milk prices at the retail level

Other matters pertaining to the milk support program on which USDA may make decisions and on which the public may comment are. the manufacturing margins used in calculating the Sales Division, Room 5741 purchase prices of cheese, butter and nonfat dry milk; the allocation of any change in the support price for milk affecting the purchase prices set for butter and nonfat dry milk; and the level of the sales prices of CCC-owned dairy products. Comments must be in writing and received no later than August 18 by the




