

Cooperatives name winners in 1980 youth institute

WEST CHESTER — Alan England, Oxford; Duane Hershey, Cochranville; Susan Kulp, Pottstown; John Darron Ryan, Upper Darby, Delaware County; Jeff Stoltzfus, Atglen and Ivan Yost, Christiana; have been

named winners in the Cooperative One-Day Institute.

They will represent this area at the Pennsylvania Association of Farmer Cooperatives Youth Institute and National Institute on Cooperative Education to be held at Penn State, August 9 to 14.

Lee and Judy Brown of Oxford, a young married couple, have also been selected to attend.

The winners will attend the Penn State conferences under the sponsorship of the Chester-Delaware Cooperative Council.

Winners were selected on the basis of their knowledge of the business enterprise system in America, the cooperative way of doing business, and on activities of the participants identifying them with school, community, church, and youth organizations.

The state and national institutes are designed to teach youth more about current issues facing farmer cooperatives, to help in planning their future by pointing out career possibilities in agribusiness, and provide opportunities for individual leadership development.

Approximately 60 young adults, representing the best of over 4000 participants in the annual PAFC youth education program, will attend the six-day event.

The institutes are a joint effort of the Pennsylvania

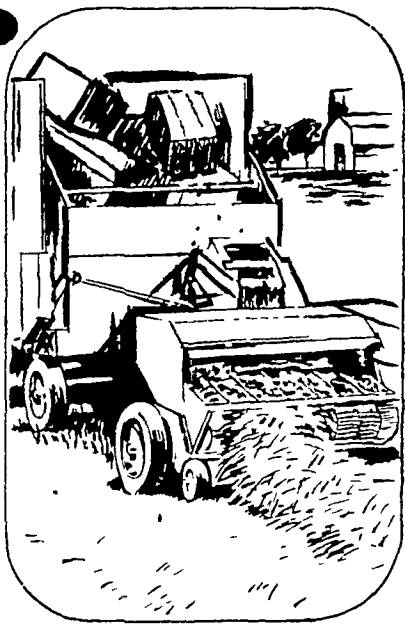
Association of Farmer Cooperatives, local Cooperative Councils, and the Penn State College of Agriculture.

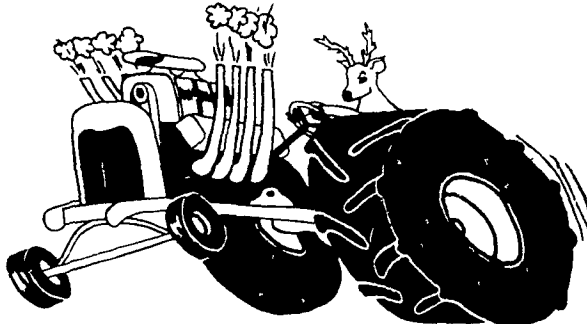

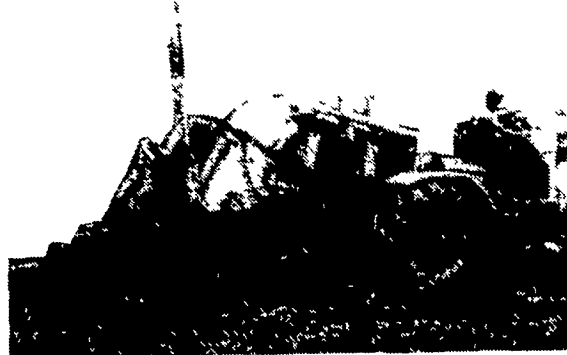

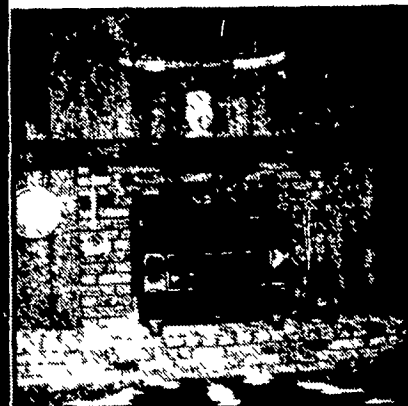
